Vale Jeff Redman

Jeff Redman was born during the Second World War in 1942. He grew up in a group that have many stories about doing fun things to cars, in cars and with cars. The yarns were as endless and wide ranging as the adventures.

In 1966 Jeff started his association with the MG Marque with the purchase of an MGTC. This car had history. It competed as the 'Red Cigar', a monoposto bodied, supercharged race car, in several Australian Grand Prix's. After a crash, the streamlined body was written off and replaced by a standard version and this is the way it was when Jeff took over as custodian.



Jeff purchased a pile of parts as spares for the TC but decided he had enough to build another MG. This ended up as a cream and brown TA.

A few years later Jeff met Merryl and she remembers trips to hill climbs and sprints at Amaroo and Oran Park. Jeff joined the MG Car Club (Newcastle) and ran the TC at King Edward Park Hill Climb and other local events as well as MG National Meetings. Jeff and Merryl's first Nat Meet was in the inaugural one in 1978 at Vaucluse House. They didn't enter that one but were official entrants in the TA at the 1979 meeting in Ballarat.

Jeff joined the Newcastle Sporting Car Club, back to Newcastle MGCC and then was foundation member #2 of the MGCC Hunter Region when the club was formed in 1987. After many years and numerous committee positions, Jeff joined the Morris Owners Club.

In 1988 many of us saw a large pile of rusty bits at the National Meeting in Canberra. Jeff saw the potential and purchased their TA Tickford. Jeff restored it to National Concours winning standard. Merryl added a BGTV8 to the stable and it too was restored. The V8 eventually gave way to a Morris Major from a local car wrecker. Of course it was restored and improved.

In 1994 Jeff rustled up a rabble of MG mates to compete in Regularity at the first Historic Race Meeting at the new Wakefield Park circuit near Goulburn. This was the start of a resurgence of his track career and the start of a new chapter in the Hunter Region MGCC's history. Jeff became a Regularity regular at Historic meetings all around NSW. He ventured to a few historic Street Sprints and Hill climbs around NSW and Queensland.

At Jeff's 50th birthday party he was surprised when he received the 'Red Cigars' original Blower from Merryl as a gift. This was duly refurbished and refitted to the motor. The TC is a joy to watch on the track and it will be with mixed emotions that we watch the next generation of the Redman clan enjoy this piece of history.

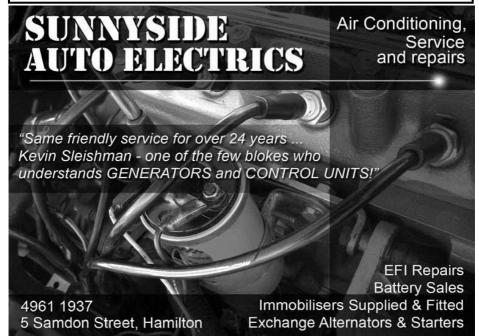
Jeff loved the written word and red wine (not necessarily in that order). As Editor of a couple of different car club magazines Jeff's articles were always engaging. There were always stories and yarns to be told, the truth often the first casualty but he was always entertaining.

Jeff was a extremely talented and skilful sign writer. Our club J Van and the MG mural on the wall in our clubrooms are excellent examples of his work. His talents were much sort after by everyone that wanted their cars, truck or trailer pin stripped or sign written the old fashion way. He was a pleasure to watch, making it look so easy. His only failing in this field was the fact that he didn't charge enough for what he did.

A mate to many, he will leave a large hole in our hearts.

We arrived in Devonport on the Wednesday morning before Easter and took the opportunity to head south and catch up with friends in Launceston for a couple of days before the National Meeting. Another exhaust gasket change in the Launceston Motor Museum car park saw us trouble free for the remainder of the rally.

On Good Friday we travelled back towards Devonport, stopping off at our accommodation in Latrobe. Here we got to meet Fraser, a 10-year-old motoring enthusiast and the son of the owners of the B&B that we were staying at. After booking in we found Fraser and one of his friends were lying on the asphalt in the car park with their pencils and paper out while they sketched our MG. It seemed a pity to have to interrupt this, but we needed to head about 25 kms up the road to Ulverstone and book into the rally. Here again (just like Perth 2 years ago) we had the ironic duty of returning perpetual speed trophys won the previous year at Adelaide by Steve Jones and Matt Blanch (ironic given our normal cruising speed is 80 kmph!)

We returned to our accommodation after an enjoyable Noggin & Natter night to find more of Fraser's car park art. This time he had used chalk to demarcate "MG Only Parking" on the ground!

Saturday saw the concours held in the Riverside Park at Ulverstone. Over 200 cars were on display, with something for everyone to enjoy. My favourite was Bob Bazzica's 1935 KN Corsica. After about 30 years of ownership, it had emerged from his shed as a restored masterpiece for the first time at this year's rally. It was a car with local links too, as Hunter member Rob Dunsterville located the remains of this vehicle in England many years ago and assisted in its importation into Australia. Maryann's favourite on Saturday

was the High Tea held at an adjacent restaurant and enjoyed by many of the "better halves".

Sunday for all of the Hunter members meant the Observation Run and a chance to explore the local country side, ending at the rural hamlet of Mole Creek.

Monday for us was the Kimber Run, another drive in the countryside this time ending at Cradle Mountain lodge. We discovered that it doesn't rain on Cradle Mountain about 12 days per year. This wasn't one of those days!

Monday night finished with the Presentation Dinner. Portland based Hunter members Norm Richardson and Lynden Broune and Norm's faithful TC were the most successful of our members. They finished first in class in the Motorkhana, second in class in the observation run and fourth in class in the concours. Ross and Sue Adams won their concours class in their MGB, while we came second in our concours class in our YT.

Following the completion of the Natmeet, we took a couple of days to explore some parts of Tasmania's east coast, visiting Wine Glass Bay and the Bay of Fires before getting back on board the Spirit of Tasmania with many new MG friends to return to the mainland.

Our return journey was a leisurely 3-day trip up the east coast visiting places we had seen before like Mallacoota and Tathra. Our adventure now means that the YT has taken us to all of Australia's states and most of the capital cities. THE ADVENTURES OF MG TC2456

England – South Africa – England By Roger Bateman

THE QUEST CONTINUES - SOUTH AFRICA

To make any progress at all, I had to find some way to trace the history in South Africa – but how? I knew nothing of the country and certainly didn't know anyone who lived there. I tried to find out information from the UK Customs and the South African Registration authorities, but neither could help.

After some thought, I decided to contact the MG Car Club of South Africa. From the import documents I knew the old South African registration number was DND 787T, and hoped someone might recognise it. From various sources I found the names of a couple of people in regional MG clubs, but they were unable to produce any results beyond telling me that the number plate was a Transvaal registration.

Then a thought occurred to me: if any family remain of the previous owners South Africa they may well not be MG enthusiasts, let alone car enthusiasts, and therefore would not be active in the MG scene today. This led on to the bright idea that I should write to the Johannesburg Star, one of the Transvaal (now Gauteng) mainstream newspapers.

They published my letter and, in due course, I was excited to receive an email from a member of the MG Car Club Johannesburg Centre. He kindly said he'd see what he could do to help. This resulted in TC2456's picture appearing on the cover of the January 2016 issue of their club magazine, *Thumbs Up*, plus an article outlining my quest inside.

Despite very high hopes that this would crack the problem, nothing came of it.

Then, after a while, I remembered that in my last job (working for a pre-war Bentley restorer) we had a customer who specialised in researching vehicle histories. I got in touch with him, not realising that he had originated from the Eastern Cape of South Africa and had owned an MG TC himself. He was enthusiastic and gave me a wealth of suggestions, including such contacts as Dr Joan Parker who maintains a register of MGs in South Africa.

Dr Parker replied saying she only kept details of TDs but suggested I contact the Secretary of the Johannesburg MG Car Club (who had, of course, already unsuccessfully published my plea in their *Thumbs Up* magazine). Of course, I did so again, and club chairman Bruce Dixon got in touch to say he would try to find out the ownership history of DND 787T.

Well – what Bruce did, and how he did it, I have no idea. I probably shouldn't know either, but I am extraordinarily grateful to him! Within a couple of weeks' he sent me a laconic message informing me that "the name of the last registered owner was J. Kat". Bingo!

Bruce had also discovered his ID Number which indicated that he was 85 years old in 2016. But, unfortunately, no contact details were available through the normal channels.

But now I had a name to toy with, a real person who had owned TC2456, and something to get my teeth into. However, considering his age, I had to realistically consider that he might no longer be alive. After much Googling, attacking the problem from different angles, I discovered that there was a firm of quantity surveyors in Pretoria called J Kat and Associates. This being such an unusual name, there had to be some connection. There was a string of phone numbers for this firm in the yellow pages – none of which worked except one, but that went unanswered.

Then tackling it from the quantity surveyor angle, I found that J Kat and Associates were listed as members of the Association of South African Quantity Surveyors. Their helpful secretary confirmed that the firm's proprietor, Mr *Jacob* Kat, was indeed a still member but now retired (at 85, so I should hope!). She wouldn't pass me his contact details for confidentiality reasons, but agreed to ask him if he would speak with me. In due course I was told that if he had indeed owned the car, he would be pleased to do so. Would I send details and a photo to pass on to him? This I did with alacrity and waited for a response.

But the response was stony silence. By now it was mid-December 2016 and I didn't realise that South Africa virtually shuts down for a month at Christmas. I bided my time impatiently until January 12, and then followed up with the Association. I was told that Mr Kat's memory is not as sharp as it used to be and he couldn't recall the car, so they were regretfully unable do any more to help me.

So, what next? I felt I had hit a brick wall again.

I decided to try the unanswered phone number for J Kat & Associates periodically at different times of the day, and eventually the phone was picked up by a courteous gentleman who replied, yes, he was indeed Mr Kat. He was intrigued by my quest, but was very apologetic that he couldn't remember this MG. However, he told me that cars were his passion, particularly MGs and Jaguars.

He then suggested that I talk with his daughter, Ingrid, who might be able to help. He gave me her mobile number, which I rang, only to discover to my astonishment that she lives less than 100 miles from me in London UK! Even more remarkable, at that very moment she was packing to fly to South Africa to visit her father, and she agreed to see what she could find out about TC2456.

A day or two later and I would have missed her!

Ingrid was incredibly helpful, despite being very busy with family matters while she was in South Africa. She was there for 2 or 3 weeks and emailed me periodically with information she had discovered. First came a series of

photos taken in the 1980s of her father with the MG.

There can be no doubt that it is the same car as there are some features that are still present on the car today.

Then, to my surprise, a photo of a TC wooden dashboard arrived in my inbox with the message that it belonged to TC2456 and had been found displayed over Jacob's fireplace.

The photo from Ingrid of the wooden dashboard that had been displayed over Jacob Kat's fireplace for three decades. This style was fitted to all TCs until replaced with a Rexine covered panel at about TC5000.

Ingrid promised to bring the dashboard back as hand luggage along with some documents she had found! She was as good as her word and I went to visit her in London to collect them. No way was I going to entrust them to couriers! The documents were remarkable in that they were the key to unlocking the history of the car from 1967 right up to when it was shipped to the UK in 1986, helping to reveal the following fascinating story.

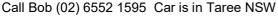
